About the National Merit Competition...

About 1.5 million students in more than 22,000 high schools entered the 2014 National Merit Scholarship Program by taking the 2012 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test. The 16,000 Semifinalists, announced in September 2013, were the highest-scoring entrants in each state and represent less than 1 percent of each state's high school seniors. They are the only participants who qualify to continue as Finalists in the competition for National Merit Scholarships to be awarded in spring 2014.

The National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) designates Semifinalists on a state representational basis to ensure that outstanding students from across the country are included in the talent pool. The number named in each state is in proportion to its percentage of the national total of graduating high school seniors. The Semifinalist allocation for a state that enrolls 2% of the nation's graduating seniors is about 320, or 2% of 16,000. Louisiana's 207 Semifinalists represent 1% of 16,000. Jesuit's 35 honorees is the largest number among Louisiana's 51 schools with Semifinalists and represents 17% of the state's entire allocation.

To be considered in the rigorous competition for National Merit Scholarships, Semifinalists must advance to the Finalist level by meeting additional standards and fulfilling several requirements. Each Semifinalist must maintain a record of high academic performance and write an essay that describes his volunteer activities, leadership positions, and significant honors and achievements.







The National Merit Scholarship Corporation oversees this academic competition which was established in 1964 to recognize outstanding African-American high school students. Of the more than 160,000 students who enter the competition each year, 1,600 are designated as Semifinalists. To ensure that academically

talented African-American students throughout the nation are included in the pool, Semifinalists are named on a regional representation basis. Semifinalists are the highest-scoring program participants in the states that constitute each region. They must advance to Finalist standing by meeting high academic standards and other requirements.

About the National Hispanic Recognition Program..

The College Board oversees the National Hispanic Recognition Program (NHRP) to identify academically outstanding Hispanic/ Latino high school students. Although the NHRP does not provide a financial award, being named is an important academic recognition for approximately 5,000 of the highestscoring students. The NHRP provides information to

colleges and universities that are particularly interested in communicating with academically exceptional Hispanic/ Latino students. Qualified students must be at least one-quarter Hispanic/Latino, which is an ethnic category, not a racial one. Students may be of any race.
