# Brother William Dardis, S.J. 1940-2019

There was a notable absence on the Jesuit High School campus as the Class of 2020 began its senior year last August.

Brother Billy Dardis, S.J., died earlier last summer. He was 79. His spirit, however, will live forever, not only on the grounds of Carrollton and Banks, but in the hearts of the thosands upon thousands of students and alumni whom he influenced.

Brother Dardis served the school community and that of his fellow Jesuits for more than 50 years. An ultimate example of a humble man for others, he served as a homeroom teacher, maintenance department director, handyman, groundskeeper, bus driver, leader of alumni, altar server, recorder of the dearly deceased, moderator of such clubs as the cheerleaders, and leader of alumni.

In the greater community, he was a friend to all, a fighter for the underdog and the poor, and a tireless promoter of school spirit.

He supported the struggling student as a tutor, lent an ear to the lonely student and always provided a warm smile just when it seemed to be needed, whether selling ice cream and popsicles after school or simply passing by in the halls.

He was the institutional memory of those corridors. Fittingly, he was inducted into the Hall of Honors in 2016. And earlier this year, a photographic tribute was installed along the first-floor hallway. It's hard to pass those pictures without eliciting a smile to his memory.

William Dardis was born in New Orleans on May 11, 1940, to Dr. William Dardis and Mary Katherine Schwab Dardis. In a family with deep ties to the school, Billy became a part of the Class of 1958.

Soon after graduation, he joined the Society of Jesus and was a brother in the order for nearly 61 of his 79 years. Most of that time was spent serving at his beloved alma mater.

His teaching, both to students and colleagues on the faculty and staff, came beyond the classroom, ranging from the athletic fields to the Commons, through Thanksgiving and Mission drives, at every Bazaar and fishing rodeo, and in the reverent participation in daily

Masses. He gave us all invaluable lessons of life itself, a life always cognizant of the grace of our loving God.

In 2010, he received the annual Profile Award, nominated by the faculty for excellence in service.

The man who personified all that Jesuit High School has meant is sorely missed.

It is with deepest gratitude that *The Blue Jay* dedicates this Senior Issue to his memory.

We'll always miss you, Darlin' but we'll never forget you.

Fast forward. Five years later, you see the end in sight. That stage you worked so hard to cross is well in range.


Only a world-changing event can stop

The Jesuit High School Marching and Concert Bands faced a myriad of challenges and adventures this year and have come out on top after grueling months of hard work.

The Marching Band worked hard this year to put together its field show titled "Machine." The show was performed at countless football games both at home and away while supporting the Blue Jays. Their hard work also came to a culmination on Oct. 28 at the District VI LMEA Marching Festival at Metairie's Joe Yenni Stadium

There, under the direction of drum majors Lloyd Passafume and Hunter Richardson, they performed their show before a panel of judges alongside fellow bands from across the greater New Orleans area.

In a spectacular showing, the Blue Jay Marching Band, joined by the Jayettes Dance Team, scored the highest marks in General Band, Percussion, Auxiliary, and Drum Majors, sweeping all categories for the first time in two years.

# Blue Jay Athlete of Year Jordan is bound for Yale

In the final fight scene of "Rocky IV," the long, actionpacked montage begins when the Rocky Balboa delivers a right hook to Ivan Drago, drawing blood upon impact. In that moment, Rocky realizes that the tall Soviet monster is "not a machine, he's a man."

Similarly, Grant Jordan has managed to fight defenses with both his arm and his legs, exposing their human weaknesses, since he was 6 years old.

Even back then, Jordan played quarterback. He played for the Girard Playground rec team, a team that was known for throwing around 10 passes a game - unheard of in football at that age. His ability to throw accurate out-routes and go-routes made his team look like an "allstar" franchise.

From there, he took his talent to Christian Brothers School, where he became an integral part of an improving team. By his seventh-grade season, his team was able to win both of their games played in the annual Gatlinburg tournament. Jordan was a rising star.

When he arrived on the campus of Carrollton and Banks, Jordan made the eighth-grade roster as one of two quarterbacks. Unfortunately, his season ended when he separated his left shoulder in the second game of the sea-

Jordan would go on to make the varsity football team as a freshman. He looked up to firststring quarterback Denny McGinnis '17, describing him as a "very strong leader."

Jordan was moved to safety in his sophomore year, a rough transition for the aspiring QB. After practice, he would see a

trainer for another two hours to maintain his throwing techniques and mechanics.

In his junior year, Jordan remained at safety, and wouldn't get the starting job just yet. Another one of his mentors, Robert McMahon '19, would be the quarterback for the season. Throughout the 2018 season, Jordan learned and developed from watching McMahon play.

The day after the 2018 playoff loss to John Curtis, Jordan went straight to training. He knew "this was my one shot to prove to everybody that I should be the quarterback" and that "I could be one of the best in the state," he said.

He refined both his physical and his leadership skills, resulting in an outstanding senior year performance on the leading the Blue Jay football team.

Jordan finished the 2019 season with almost 3,000 yards and 29 touchdowns on a team that went 7-5. Jordan wasn't alone in fight. His main targets were Luke Besh, Luke LaForge and Grant Moreau. "It was an honor to play with these guys," Jordan said.

Another of Grant's weapons that season was Rader Jackson, his running back. Their chemistry with the read option made such plays effective all season.

Jordan also was quick to point out the offensive line, comprised of Effy Marks, Brian Balestra, Jake Berault, Max McMahon, Dalton Baglio, and Jake Murphy, saying that not a single play could have happened without them.

That offense made key plays all season long, especially in the 100th Rivalry Game against Holy Cross. In that game, tied 14-14 with four minutes left, the offense drove down the field for a touchdown – a run by Jordan.

But Jordan said that wasn't the best game in which he's ever played. That accolade belongs to the playoff game against John Curtis. It was a one-sided game until the offense got going. This is the game where Jordan said he pictures that scene from "Rocky IV." Even though Curtis was the stronger team, Jesuit found ways to cut into the big lead, falling just short in a 34-27 loss.

When asked about his stats and his leadership, Jordan was quick to point out the people who blocked for him, ran the ball with him, and caught his passes. Everyone on his team took that "leadership role" in one way or another, which he says is why the team was so effective this year.

Despite his successful play this year, Jordan just wants to be seen as a "friendly, good guy" in the class of 2020. "I really do love the guys in our class." He knows that we'll always be here for one another because of our incredibly tight bond.

Grant will go on to Yale University, where he'll be playing quarterback and studying business. He also plans to take part in theater at Yale, making Mrs. Arthurs-Goldberg proud, of
